PUBLIC COMMENT

Public comment is the opportunity for members of the public to participate in meetings by addressing the Casa Conejo Municipal Advisory Council in connection with one or more agenda or non-agenda items. Public comments by a member of the public at a single meeting are limited to a cumulative total of five minutes at such meeting unless the time allotment is increased or decreased by the Chair depending on the number of speakers. The public comment period during the opening part of the meeting to address non-agenda items is limited to 30 minutes total for all speakers; this 30-minute limit does not apply to items on the agenda.

To maintain a public meeting environment conductive and welcoming to receiving public comments from all members of the public, the audience is discouraged from engaging in displays of support or opposition to staff reports or public comments, including clapping, yelling, booing, hissing or cheering, that may create a disruptive environment for members of the public wishing to participate. Any person who disrupts or impedes the orderly conduct of a meeting will be instructed to cease the disruptive conduct. Failure to do so may result in that person being removed from the meeting.

Members of the public who would like to augment their comments with visual or audio presentations must submit their materials to the israel.rodriguez@ventura.org for review at least 48 hours before the meeting. The review will be conducted to determine only whether the materials are on matters within the jurisdiction of the Municipal Advisory Council, would be disruptive of the meeting, or would foster illegality, such as identity

theft. If it is determined that materials are about matters not within the Municipal Advisory Council's jurisdiction, or would be disruptive of the meeting, or would foster illegality, use of County-provided equipment will not be allowed.

10. California Highway Patrol (CHP)

- CHP Moorpark and the Moorpark Police Department (Ventura County Sheriff) will be hosting a National Night Out event at our station on August 5th from 5-7 p.m. This event will give the public a chance to see our station and check out our patrol and special enforcement vehicles. We will also be holding a "bike rodeo" for new, young bicycle riders which will include a skills course and a helmet fitting station. We look forward to seeing you and your families at this fun event.
- The CHP Moorpark Area continues to monitor and enforce the Oversized and Recreational Vehicle ordinance in Casa Conejo. As you know, the motorhome that continues to park in casa Conejo near Jenny Dr. and Lesser Dr. has moved a short distance across the street. The motorhome has a new owner, and we are working with that new owner to completely remove the motorhome from Casa Conejo. We thank you for your patience with this process and we are confident we will have this issue fully resolved very soon.
- The California Highway Patrol will be conducting a Maximum Enforcement Period (MEP) over the Independence Day weekend. The MEP will run from Wednesday, July 3rd through Sunday, July 7th. A focus for this MEP will be speed violations. During the Memorial Day Maximum Enforcement Period, the CHP made over 1,100 arrests for DUI, issued over 19,000 citations for speed violations, over 800

of those were for speeding over 100 MPH, and issued over 1,800 citations for seatbelt violations. This resulted in an almost 20% decrease in fatal crashes statewide over the last Memorial Day MEP. Additionally, there were no fatal crashes within CHP Moorpark's area of service, and overall, there were only four crashes total reported within our area during the MEP.

- The California Highway Patrol is hiring 1,000 officers to help make California's roadways safer. If you or someone you know would like to join the CHP, visit www.betheCHP1000.com for more information and to speak with a local recruiter. Also, the CHP is hiring more than just officers. We are currently looking to fill 165 dispatcher vacancies across the state and are also looking for Commercial Vehicle Inspection Specialists to inspect the growing number of commercial vehicles on California highways. The statewide examination for CVIS recently opened with a final filing date of 8/1/2024. The CHP will provide you with the training for all three of these positions. 11. Ventura County Fire Department

- Ventura County experienced several brush fires during the first week of July. At least two were started by illegal fireworks. Meanwhile, all the permitted 4th of July fireworks shows were delivered without incident.
- Conditions are dry throughout the county and recent high temperatures have only
 increased the drying of grass and light brush. Be careful to avoid starting a fire.
 All it takes is a spark from a loose tow chain, a hot muffler against tall grasses or
 a tossed cigarette.
- Junior Fire Academy is underway at VCFD's Regional Training Center in Camarillo. Throughout the month, about 90 teenage participants will spend a week learning basic firefighter skills, including how to use a firehose, crawling through confined

spaces, rappelling and using hand tools.

12. Ventura Sheriff Department

This report will cover later June reported crimes in the Casa Conejo community.

Deputies responded to 29 calls for service during the month of June. Deputies took 4 reports and made 1 arrest for being under the influence of a controlled substance. Not all calls for service generate a report. They made 3 self-initiated contacts. A self-initiated contact could be a traffic enforcement stop or a pedestrian stop.

Fraud/Forgery crimes: Deputies responded to a possible financial elder abuse call. During their investigation it was determined no crime had been committed. They consulted with East County Financial Crimes Detectives.

There were no fraud crimes reported during this time period. Throughout the area we are still seeing a pattern of phone and computer scams. Remind your community members if individuals ask for banking information or personal information this is a scam. These scammers will also ask for you to pay for services via gift cards or crypto currency. These are red flags and if you receive these calls hang up and call the Sheriff's Office.

Assault Crimes: There was 1 arrest for a domestic violence investigation. The case was filed with the DA by East County Major Crimes.

There was 1 call of domestic violence. Patrol deputies responded to the investigation and the suspects were arrested at the scene.

Burglary: There were no reports of residential or vehicle burglaries.

Deputies responded to a call for service and arrested a suspect for being under the influence of a controlled substance. During their investigation, they found narcotics and illegal fireworks. The suspect was booked for the charges and the case was filed with the DA's Office.

Encourage your community members to check their security cameras to ensure they are working properly. This is one of the best tools for investigators to identify suspects. Earlier this year there were numerous thefts from unlocked vehicles in the north end of Thousand Oaks. These crimes could have been avoided if the vehicles were locked. We are reminding everyone to lock their vehicles and remove all their valuable items. Casa Conejo is a very safe community, but the criminal element preys on this and will take advantage of it. Remove it, Lock it, Keep it.

 Speakers:
 - Wendy Zimmerman spoke on the importance of having and wearing emergency dog-tags which could help in the event someone gets hurt.
 - **Henry Vargas** is concerned about weeds and trash in front of a neighbor's house and asked about what can be done to address the situation.
- 8. Office of Ventura County Supervisor Jeff Gorell's Comments Brief announcements and report on County activities.
 - Supervisor Gorell spoke about the recent PIT Count and the rise of homelessness in District 2. As a result, the Board of Supervisor's passed a measure to fund more resources to address the homelessness situation including the addition of 8 new homeless liaison deputies, funding of \$2.9 million for un-housed and recently broke ground for supportive housing project in Thousand Oaks which is funded in part by the County.
 - Proposition 1 passed which shifts money from early preventive health settings
 to brick and mortar facilities to directly help this who are resistant to support.
 Takes money away from mental health in schools to more chronic and
 challenging conditions. Usually, cities provide brick-and-mortar support for
 those who need it the most and counties provide the services.

- A question was asked about the impact of Proposition 1. Will the shifting of funds create more issues? **Supervisor Gorell** said that we still do not know how it will impact our communities, but this County has a good record of working with our mentally ill and we will need to look at more ways to fund the areas that are losing funding. Question from audience about the issue with the City of Thousand Oaks and the Shangri-La project. **Supervisor Gorell** stated that your local elected officials acted in good faith but were deceived by the financial situation with that organization handling the construction of the project. Contracts are difficult but not criminal and have to be addressed through civil process which is slow and difficult. Hopefully, the City of Thousand Oaks can jump back on the track and find a new partner because the need is there.

• The California Highway Patrol will be conducting a Maximum Enforcement Period (MEP) over the Memorial Day weekend. The MEP will run from Friday, May 24th through Monday, May 27th. A focus for this MEP will be seatbelt use

- by ALL vehicle occupants. This coincides with the nationwide "Click it or Ticket" campaign, which runs May 20th to June 2nd.
- The CHP Moorpark Area continues to send Special Enforcement Units (SEU) to conduct targeted patrols throughout Casa Conejo. Citations are being issued for unsafe turns, unsafe passing, posted signage violations, unsafe speed, and various parking violations. Targeted patrols help saturate an area where multiple violations are known to be happening at once so multiple violations can be addressed in the area simultaneously. We also continue to monitor the parking of recreational and oversized vehicles in violation of the Casa Conejo ordinance.
- May is National Bicycle Safety month. Bicyclists have all the rights and responsibilities of a motor vehicle driver and are responsible for complying with the California Vehicle Code (CVC). Bicycle crashes can cause serious, potentially life-threatening injuries. All bicyclists should wear properly fitted bicycle helmets every time they ride wearing a helmet is the single most effective way to prevent head injury resulting from a crash.

11. Ventura County Fire Department

- Annual notices for the Ventura County Fire Department's Fire Hazard Reduction Program have been sent to about 18,000 property owners in high fire hazard areas covered by the program. Front desk operations for plan submittals, reviews payments and other needs will start at the new headquarters May 20. Those operations will continue at the existing Camarillo headquarters until May 31.

<u>12.Ventura Sheriff Department</u> During the months of March and April deputies responded to 9 calls for service.

- There was 1 arrest made by deputies from a traffic enforcement stop.

 were started by illegal fireworks. Meanwhile, all the permitted 4th of July fireworks shows
 were delivered without incident.
- Conditions are dry throughout the county and recent high temperatures have only increased the drying of grass and light brush. Be careful to avoid starting a fire. All it takes is a spark from a loose tow chain, a hot muffler against tall grasses or a tossed cigarette.
- Junior Fire Academy is underway at VCFD's Regional Training Center in Camarillo.
 Throughout the month, about 90 teenage participants will spend a week learning basic firefighter skills, including how to use a firehose, crawling through confined spaces, rappelling and using hand tools.

RE: June MAC Law Enforcement Report

This report will cover later June reported crimes in the Casa Conejo community.

Deputies responded to 29 calls for service during the month of June. Deputies took 4 reports and made 1 arrest for being under the influence of a controlled substance. Not all calls for service generate a report. They made 3 self-initiated contacts. A self-initiated contact could be a traffic enforcement stop or a pedestrian stop.

Fraud/Forgery crimes:

Deputies responded to a possible financial elder abuse call. During their investigation it was determined no crime had been committed. They consulted with East County Financial Crimes Detectives.

There were no fraud crimes reported during this time period. Throughout the area we are still seeing a pattern of phone and computer scams. Remind your community members if individuals ask for banking information or personal information this is a scam. These scammers will also ask for you to pay for services via gift cards or crypto currency. These are red flags and if you receive these calls hang up and call the Sheriff's Office.

Assault Crimes:

There was 1 arrest for a domestic violence investigation. The case was filed with the DA by East County Major Crimes.

There was 1 call of domestic violence. Patrol deputies responded to the investigation and the suspects were arrested at the scene.

Burglary:

There were no reports of residential or vehicle burglaries.

Deputies responded to a call for service and arrested a suspect for being under the influence of a controlled substance. During their investigation, they found narcotics and illegal fireworks. The suspect was booked for the charges and the case was filed with the DA's Office.

Encourage your community members to check their security cameras to ensure they are properly working. This is one of the best tools for investigators to identify suspects.

Earlier this year there were numerous thefts from unlocked vehicles in the north end of Thousand Oaks. These crimes could have been avoided if the vehicles were locked. We are reminding everyone to lock their vehicles and remove all their valuable items. Casa Conejo is a very safe community, but the criminal element preys on this and will take advantage of it. Remove it, Lock it, Keep it.
